The Army Cadet League of Canada (the "League" or "we") was formed in 1971 as a civilian organization to support the army cadet program while working in partnership with the Department of National Defence ("DND") and communities. The League engages with more than 3,100 volunteers across Canada at the national, provincial/territorial and local levels.

The League is a civilian, not-for-profit charitable organization. We encourage our youth to become better Canadians through the citizenship, fitness, and leadership training offered in the Army Cadet program. Our services include financial support to the cadet program not provided by DND, League governance, training for members and volunteers, and program advocacy.

 We, in partnership with the Canadian Armed Forces, provide essential support to the Royal Canadian Army Cadet program.



### **ABOUT ARMY CADETS**



Army Cadets develop skills that help youth transition into adulthood, including good citizenship, leadership, and physical fitness. Cadets partake in experiences that aren't found elsewhere - Army Cadets participate in outdoor expeditions, trekking, orienteering, biathlons and abseiling. Participation comes at no cost to youth, making it an accessible and invaluable resource for their development.

Invites All Canadian Youth Cadet programs are open to all youth aged 12 to 18 who are Canadian citizens or are authorized to reside in Canada. Although the program is expected to be physically and mentally challenging, there will be no artificial barriers developed which preclude participation based on gender, race, culture, religion, education, socio-economic status or ability. The program will make reasonable efforts to accommodate participants.

Develops Citizenship, Leadership, and Fitness The Cadet program helps participants progressively develop into adults who contribute positively to Canadian society as leaders, while instilling a lifelong appreciation of health and fitness.

Leaves a positive lifelong impact

Whether youth stay with the program for many years or for just a few weeks, it is imperative that they remember the experience positively to help guide their development as productive Canadians.

Instills Canadian Military Values The development of the Cadet Program is guided by the best of Canadian military values and ethics. These values include respecting the dignity of all people and serving Canada before self. Additionally, cadets will gain better appreciation of the specific values of duty, loyalty, integrity, courage, stewardship, and excellence as expected of all Canadian Armed Forces members.

### LEADERSHIP MESSAGE

Our journey continues to deliver on our vision of Strengthening Canada by supporting local youth empowerment.

Throughout 2023, our partners at the Department of National Defence (DND) witnessed a resurgence in cadet numbers. This is creating opportunities, as well as strains, for The Army Cadet League of Canada and its ability to support our national network of branches, volunteers, and membership in the post-pandemic recovery. We faced cost inflation and national office staffing changes but remained steadfast in our commitment to supporting our network and DND colleagues.

Our partnership with the military has seen significant strides in communication and cooperation, though we acknowledge there is more work to be done. With the considerable change we are each experiencing, we work diligently with our partners to ensure that key messages and policy implementation remains consistent throughout Canada.

Through the Royal Canadian Legion and ANAVETS Dominion Commands, we have amazing supporters and maintained active engagement with them in areas of mutual interest.

The National Office worked closely with Branches and Corps Support Committees to ensure we remained current with the pulse of the organization. Some of the resulting initiatives included:

- Updating our criteria for League membership to ensure we are accessible and inclusive.
- Launching a new membership portal that improves experiences such as email communications and online membership renewals.
- Improving our reporting at the Support Committee, Branch and National levels to support our discussions with our military partners and address our insurance requirements.
- Implementing new visit reports, to assist leaders in managing their jurisdictions, and identify areas for improvement while celebrating successes. These reports are a crucial requirement to identify priorities across the country and within the League.
- Ensuring timely screening of our volunteers.
- Reducing long-term costs by moving to a more cost-effective location in Ottawa.
- Improving our marketing to promote the League and the Royal Canadian Army Cadets.



### **LEADERSHIP MESSAGE CONT'D**

We continue to value reconciliation, diversity, equity and inclusion (EDI), throughout our work. At our Board meeting in April in Ottawa, we learned about and discussed these topics through sessions led by Volunteer Ottawa. We recognize the importance of promoting education and awareness to foster understanding, empathy, and solidarity among our members and volunteers.

Hari Panday, CD, FCPA, FCGA, ICD.D, NACD.DC engaged the Board in governance for the not-for-profit sector. Discussions focused on the role and responsibilities of directors and the board overall, accountability, risk management, board skills planning, and stakeholder relations, among other topics.

We launched a new Governance and Nominations Committee that developed the groundwork to address the complexity and expectations of not-for-profit organizations like ours. We joined Imagine Canada, a leading Canadian organization assisting charities and the nonprofit sector to better serve individuals and communities through education, best practices, and a stronger governance infrastructure. On behalf of the Board, the Committee launched a new board self-assessment survey providing a baseline benchmark for future years' surveys. The Committee updated several policies, including the League Complaints (Whistleblower) Policy.

In the fall, we held working sessions with a small group of Board members and subject matter experts to launch our work on governance, technology, reporting and fund generation priorities. With the growing need for consistent and accurate reporting and increasing risks arising from data security and cyber-crimes, we are looking at the best and most cost-effective solutions for the League.

We are grateful and wish to thank our DND partners for our annual grant, upon which we are financially dependent. Given that cost pressures are expected to continue, albeit at a more normalized pace, and we need to fund new initiatives, we are establishing a new fund generation team to apply for additional grants and seek donations. Donations are always welcome, and we thank those individuals and organizations who contribute to the League.

We extend our sincere gratitude to our employees, board members, League members and volunteers. We appreciate the countless hours you contribute and the passion you bring to the League and cadets.

### **2023 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS**

The Army Cadet League of Canada's Annual Report 2023

In 2023, our revenue grew by an impressive 11% compared to the previous year, showcasing our robust financial health and continued success. While expenses rose by 26%, leading to a modest operating deficit of \$50,105 (7% of revenue), we effectively managed this shortfall through our unrestricted cash reserves accumulated from previous surpluses. This deficit was due to known and planned one-time expenses related to the move of our National Office.

Our Internally Restricted Funds remained strong, maintaining, or exceeding the balances from the end of 2022.

The League continues to prudently manage externally restricted funds, which are earmarked by generous donors for specific activities. These funds are kept in dedicated accounts and investments, with revenues and expenses carefully tracked and detailed on page eleven of the 2023 Financial Statements.

In 2023, we proudly awarded over \$25,000 to deserving recipients from our Restricted Funds, in addition to awards supported by our general funds.

Additionally, we successfully repaid the noninterest bearing \$60,000 Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan received in 2020, qualifying for a \$20,000 loan forgiveness grant.

Overall, our financial management and strategic investments are positioning us well for continued growth and success.





#### **Gender Diversity**

The League is pleased to share gender representation among our 3400 dedicated members and volunteers. As of January 2024, based on a randomly selected 10% sample, our cohort consisted of 50% male, 49% female, and 1% individuals who identified as non-binary, genderqueer, or preferred not to disclose their gender identity.

We are steadfast in our commitment to cultivating an inclusive environment where all individuals are honored and respected.




#### Membership Self-Declaration

Across the League's membership of 232 people, the results of our inaugural *Membership Self-Declaration Survey* provided valuable insights, with 80% membership participation. This data serves as a foundation for understanding the representation of different identities across our national membership. Results included:

- 70% reported no minority or disability
- · 5% reported a disability
- · 4% reported being a visible minority
- 1% reported of indigenous descent

We recognize the importance of continued efforts to promote awareness and encourage participation in initiatives aimed at fostering diversity and inclusion within our organization.



#### Membership First Language

The League embraces diversity as reflected in our linguistic landscape.

We invited members to share their first language, revealing a rich tapestry of cultural backgrounds. The accompanying chart illustrates that 79% report speaking one of Canada's Official Languages. Significantly, 21% of members reported having a different first language, pointing to the inclusive nature of our organization. These findings celebrate our commitment to fostering a welcoming environment for all.


As we move forward, we remain focused on bridging distances and fostering connections, ensuring that every corner of Canada benefits from our expertise and resources.

### 2023 OUTSTANDING ARMY CADET: GENERAL WALSH COMMEMORATIVE SWORD AWARD

In 2022, Jake was named the recipient of the Walsh Memorial Sword - Canada's Outstanding Cadet. As such, he was invited to represent Army Cadets from across Canada at the National Remembrance Day ceremonies in Ottawa.

During this time he visited Beechwood Military Cemetery, the final resting place of his father. He also visited Rideau Hall, where his father's likeness was captured by artist Karen Bailey in the official portrait of the Right Honourable Michaëlle Jean, former Governor General of Canada.

The Army Cadet Program offers youth with unique opportunities not found in other programs. We are proud and honoured to have been able to part of Jake's journey and contributing to this positive lifelong impact.
